Osteopathic Medicine

Only two types of physicians have unrestricted licenses and practice rights in all 50 states. While both D.O.s and M.D.s are qualified, competent and trained in all aspects of patient care, the osteopathic approach emphasizes holistic and patient-centered treatment while concentrating on wellness and prevention of disease or disability.



D.O.s historically have been distinguished by an emphasis on holistic care, using osteopathic manipulative medicine to improve the health and function of their patients and their tradition of caring for patients in underserved areas.

D.O.s respect the relationship between structure and function, viewing the human body as an interdependent unit rather than an assortment of separate parts and systems.



Accreditation

College of Osteopathic Medicine Accreditation

Rocky Vista University College of Osteopathic Medicine has obtained provisional accreditation from the Commission on Osteopathic College Accreditation (COCA) of the American Osteopathic Association (AOA). The college will be eligible for full accreditation before graduating its first class of osteopathic physicians in 2012. The AOA is recognized by the U.S. Department of Education and the Council of Post-Secondary Accreditation as the accrediting agency for colleges educating osteopathic physicians and surgeons.

CAMPUS

A state-of-the-art 145,000 square foot educational facility has been constructed to advance the education of our students and graduates. We have designed and equipped a standardized patient lab that is engineered similar to the testing facilities of the National Board of Osteopathic Medical Examiners as well as the United States Medical Licensing Examination. An extensive simulator laboratory and computer graphics programs are also available to provide you with the opportunity to develop knowledge, skills, competencies and confidence. The auditoriums, laboratories, study and learning areas of the college have been professionally engineered to develop a positive learning environment.



Academics

At RVUCOM, our success is based on the success of the individual student. You will receive individual attention and our goal is that each student achieve their personal expectations. The curriculum is designed to stimulate active learning and to develop comprehension by the student. It utilizes case-based learning opportunities, biomedical and clinical sciences, an integrated systems approach to educational models and early and extensive clinical experiences as well as outreach opportunities.

As a RVUCOM student, you will be introduced to the practice of medicine and begin to acquire clinical skills during your first semester. Our educational approach will prepare you to not only acquire facts, but apply, integrate and utilize knowledge for the benefit of your patients. You will learn to evaluate the epidemiological, psychosocial, economic, cultural and physiological issues affecting diverse populations of patients with individual needs.

You will have the opportunity to observe and participate in the care of patients in private physicians' offices, community health centers, health departments and hospitals each semester. As part of the clinical experience, all students will spend two months in a rural practice setting working with medically underserved and indigent patients. Additionally, you will have an opportunity to choose electives in areas such as International Outreach, Humanities and Spirituality in Medicine, Research Methodology and Alternative Medicine.



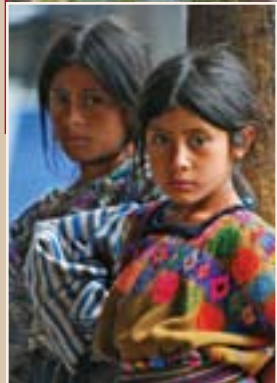

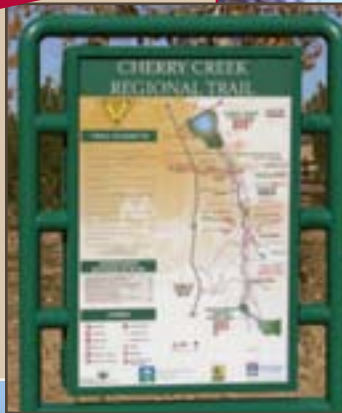

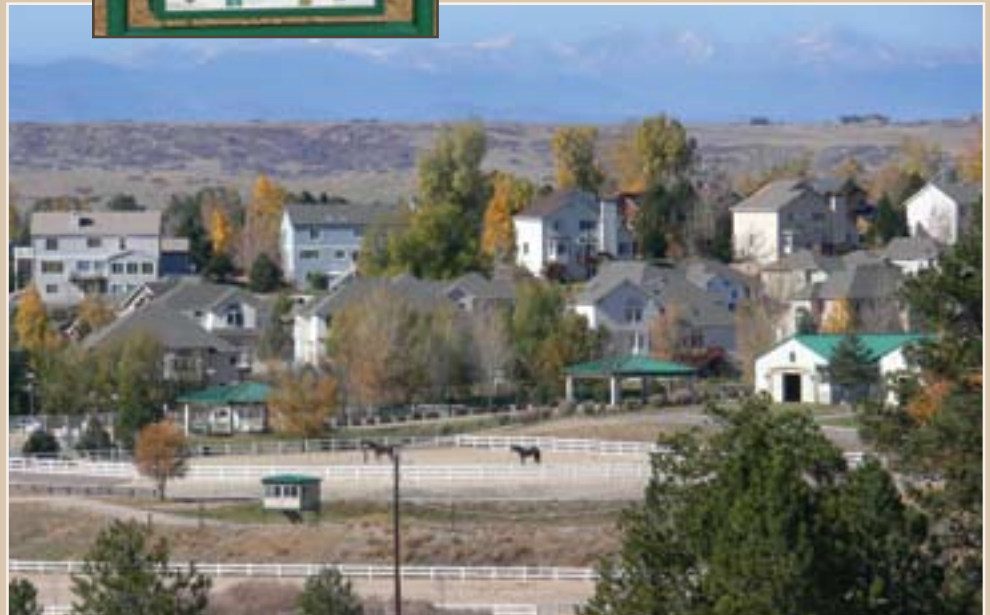
Location

RVU is located in Parker, Colorado, which is in Douglas County, just 20 miles southeast of Denver. Douglas County is a mix of rural and suburban areas, village centers and open spaces.

With a population of over 48,000 in the city of Parker and approximately 90,000 in the surrounding areas, Parker boasts an extensive biking/ jogging trail system, recreational facilities, dining and entertainment, and a wide variety of arts and community events held throughout the year. The Mile High City

Nearby metropolitan Denver offers eclectic dining, music, recreational and cultural activities. Denver also has the largest bike path network of any urban area in the nation and the largest city park system in the U.S. with 200 named parks in the city and 14,000 acres of parkland in the mountains. Skiing, snowboarding, hiking and camping are within an hour's drive of Denver. Denver is also a top spectator sports city with eight professional teams.

There are statewide festivals and events presenting arts, music, sports and culture including the state fair, music festivals of different genres, outdoor concerts and plays.

Climate

Denver has a semi-arid climate with four distinct seasons. Denver is located on the Great Plains, and the weather of the city and surrounding area is generally milder compared to the mountains to the west and the plains further east.

Admissions Process

RVUCOM seeks well-rounded, service-oriented individuals who can complete an academically rigorous curriculum. You will need to complete the following requirements to qualify for admissions consideration:

- A minimum of 90 semester hours of accepted course work (100 level or above) from a regionally accredited college or university. To be competitive, you should have earned a minimum of a bachelor's degree.
- Successful completion of the following:
 - General Biology (with lab): 8 semester hours
 - General Chemistry (with lab): 8 semester hours
 - Organic Chemistry (with lab): 8 semester hours
 - Physics (with lab): 8 semester hours
 - English Composition/Literature: 6 semester hours
- Minimum science and overall GPA of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale. *(note: this is the minimum requirement required to receive a supplemental application. Over the past 3 years, the GPA for students gaining acceptance to D.O. schools averaged 3.4)*
- MCAT scores taken within 3 years of matriculation (e.g. students matriculating August of 2009 must have taken the MCAT during or after April 2006). No score lower than a "6" in any individual section will be considered. The Office of Admissions will only consider the best composite score in the event of multiple scores and will not combine scores from different exams.



- Letters of Recommendation from a pre-health advisor or committee (if your school does not have one, you may substitute 2 letters from science faculty) and a letter from an osteopathic physician. RVUCOM accepts letters through the mail, Virtual Evaluations and Interfolio.

All applicants must apply through AACOMAS.
